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Land Bank kicks off 'Adopt A Lot'

County hopes to mobilize residents



FLINT (WJRT) - (05/17/07)-- The Genesee County Land Bank is doing its best to help clean up the city of Flint and the city's help is needed.

There are close to 400 vacant lots in Flint, and when most of us drive by them, we don't see much more than a mess. That's because most of them are untended and have no maintenance.

"It leads to rodents. It's not safe for kids," said Jeff Burdick, from the Genesee County Land Bank.

"If they don't take ownership, it falls to the wayside. Unsafe conditions, kids, walking to school," added Glenn Johnson, also from the Land Bank.

"If it's your neighborhood and it's next to your house, it affects you greatly," Burdick said.

Which is why a new initiative was launched today (Thursday). It's called Adopt A Lot, and it forces people to take action. "We're actually depending on the community to help us help them," Johnson said.

Here is how it works. If you see an unmanaged, blighted vacant lot, the Genesee County Land Bank wants to challenge you and your neighbors to assume responsibility for the upkeep.

"It's allowing people to adopt lots the Land Bank owns in their neighborhood (and) gives them better control of the maintenance near their property," Burdick said.

Experts say it also helps lower crime, raises property value. Perhaps most important, it raises morale.

"This is our town, our community. We almost owe it to ourselves. The more people that can deal with blight, the worse it'll get. If we put a stop to it now and take initiative, do something about it, a domino effect will take place," Johnson said.
